

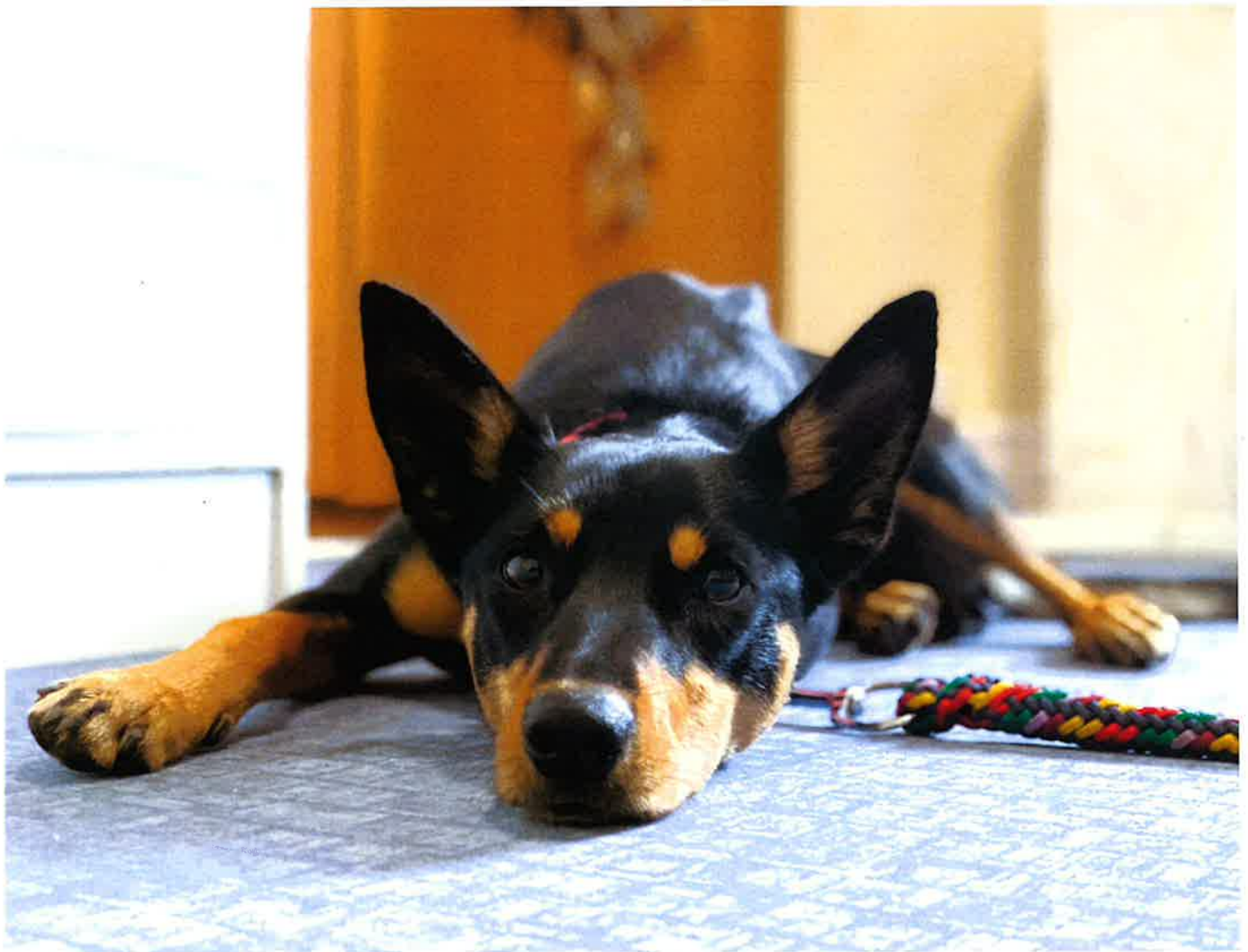

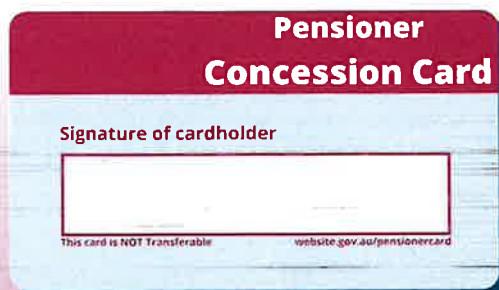

Previous meeting read and passed, seconded by D. Fletcher

Business arising from previous meeting:

- Following some discussion between residents and head chef Samuel Hooper, next year's Easter meal will consist of traditionally-prepared cod fish, with hot-cross buns offered during both the morning and afternoon.

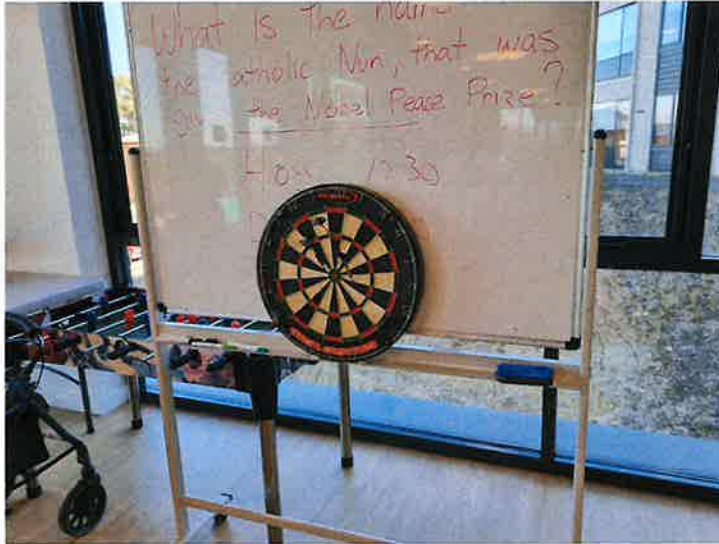

If you've ever played or watched bingo in a traditional bingo hall or even just dabbled in some online bingo you may have noticed that there are some strange bingo names that you simply don't understand. Calling bingo numbers out isn't as simple as just 1, 2, 3... and you weren't mistaken if you think you may have heard something about little ducks or Winnie the pooh.

How is modern bingo played?

Before we get to the bingo terms, we thought that we'd quickly go over the basics of bingo to refresh your memories or show you what it's about if you've never played before.

There are different kinds of bingo that can be played, but on a whole, it is played by crossing off the numbers that are on your ticket when they are called out. You win the game if you cross off all the numbers on your ticket before anyone else.

The type of game, such as a 90 ball or 75 ball, that you are taking part in will decide the amount of numbers that you have on your ticket. The amount of numbers on your ticket will be the same amount that can be called out by the bingo callers.

Don't be confused by the 'balls' in the name of your game either, it's simply due to the fact that the numbers being called out used to be printed onto balls. However, with the invention of bingo sites, almost all the bingo balls are generated electronically.

Bingo Lingo Number

Back to the "Bingo Lingo". Bingo numbers are often called out in traditional bingo rhymes. If you're new to online bingo, it may be a tad confusing hearing "Two Fat Ladies" or other modern abbreviations and bingo sayings. However, don't be alarmed if your fellow bingo players start using strange terms; bingo is a very sociable game and you simply just have to get to grips with the bingo slang meaning and you'll find yourself understanding in no time.

How did the rhymes originate?

Most of the bingo terms associated with the numbers are rhymes. They were originally used in London in the mid-20th century, where they were used to pass on secret or hidden messages. These rhymes were very quickly picked up by bingo players who used them in the bingo halls to ensure that all 90 letters could be clarified easily when called out. In a big hall, the number 15 and 50 could sound very similar, so they adopted these rhymes/nicknames in order to distinctly tell letter apart. As the use of these nicknames spread, they changed from place to place and some new bingo sayings were added.

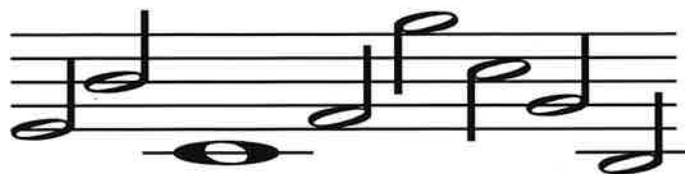
DEAL OR NO DEAL

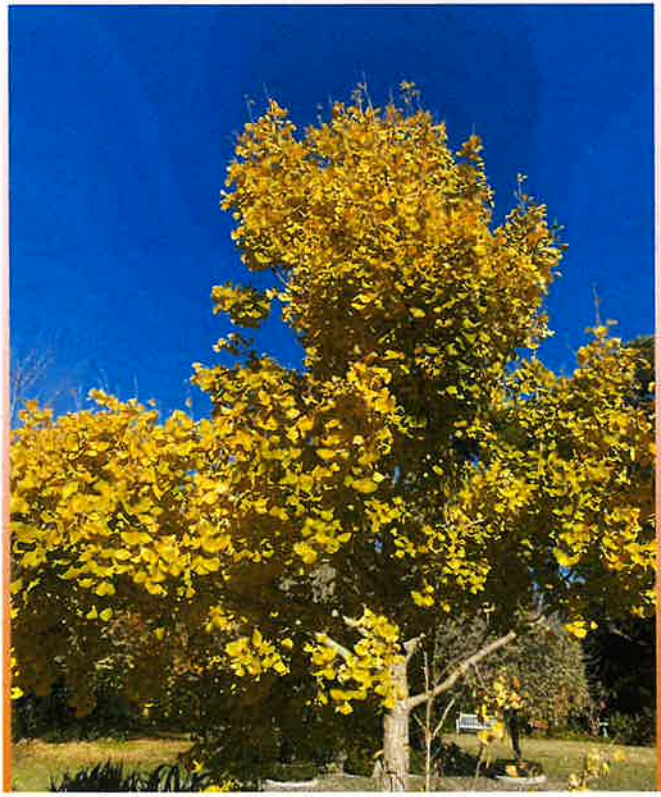

TALES OF CASTERTON



THE WAINES MURDER AND OTHER STORIES

THE 1939 BUSH FIRES AND THE STORY OF MARY McGINTY

Many people during their life times are unable to cope or survive a personal tragedy. The shattering after effects leave a perpetual mark on their life styles, their family, and health for the rest of their lives.

Mary McGinty not only survived one such tragedy, she had to cope with two. She lost the first born of two sons in tragic bush fires at Lake Mundi near Casterton in 1939, and the other babe she carried in her arms on that disastrous day met with a fatal accident off a motor bike later on in life near Casterton.

Leaving the scene of those devastating fires behind at Lake Mundi in 1939, the family shifted to a new home on Bahgallah Road, Casterton.

Here again in 1946 Mary McGinty's family had a very lucky escape from the all time high floods when their house was surrounded by deep waters, and the family had to be rescued from their ordeal by boat.

This happened once again during their sojourn on Bahgallah Road, and soon afterwards the family shifted to McPherson Street, never to live on Bahgallah Road again.

It speaks volumes for the courage and character of Mary McGinty, that despite all these set backs she and her husband reared a family of eight children, many grandchildren, and today she and her husband live happily, contented in retirement, at McPherson Street, Casterton.

Black Thursday, February 6th, 1851 is probably the first known recorded event of the disastrous bush fires that have continually ravished Victoria. Fifty years later, strange to relate, on the same date February 6th, 1901, the Western District was again devastated by bush fires with big stations like Clunie, Kadnook, Spring Valley and Mullagh being practically burnt out.

The scrub and farm lands followed by a long dry spell, and a hot summer had made the Western District in the year of 1939 tinder dry.

Friday, January 13th, 1939 began as just another summer day in the early morning. Soon it was to become known as Black Friday, with resulting loss of life, many homesteads and stations burnt out, thousands of acres destroyed in the path of the fire, and a heavy loss of stock and domestic animals.

In the Hamilton district, the bush fires overran Murroa, Buckley's Swamp, and Yatchaw, then belonging to Mr. T.H. Laidlaw, the homestead and manager's house being completely destroyed by fire. Penshurst to the Grampians was ablaze, so too was Hanrahan's Park to Hall's Gap, and there a young boy of thirteen was trapped in the fires and burnt to death.

In the Drumborg area, the Milltown Railway Station and Post Office was gutted. George Hollis's Mill at Myamyn was burnt, and a special train taking racegoers from Hamilton to Portland was turned back.

In the Casterton area, hot northerly and north westerly winds with temperatures from 100 to 108 degrees, fanned the bush fires and the whole area was at flash point. The Lake Mundi area became the focal point for the worst fires.

Mary McGinty was alone in her house at the time when the fires were at their peak. She had an infant son Leslie, and a little boy, Albert of four years. Thinking she would be trapped in the fire and the house destroyed by the fire that was raging all around her, she wrapped the baby in wet blankets, and with the other little boy Albert trailing behind her she set off to a neighbour's house. As they ran to the refuge, Albert, terrified by the flames and smoke, ran into a clump of ferns directly in front of the fire. Mary McGinty, still carrying her baby, rushed into the ferns to save him. Although badly burnt herself in the rescue she was able to bring him to a safe point.

Lucy McCalman, a neighbour, who lived nearby had taken two horses over to rescue the McGinty's but was unable to find them, as they were around the other side of the house. Kind neighbours did everything possible to save Albert. He was rushed to the Penola hospital, but died of his burns soon afterwards. Ironically, the house from which Mary McGinty and the children had fled did not get burnt at all.

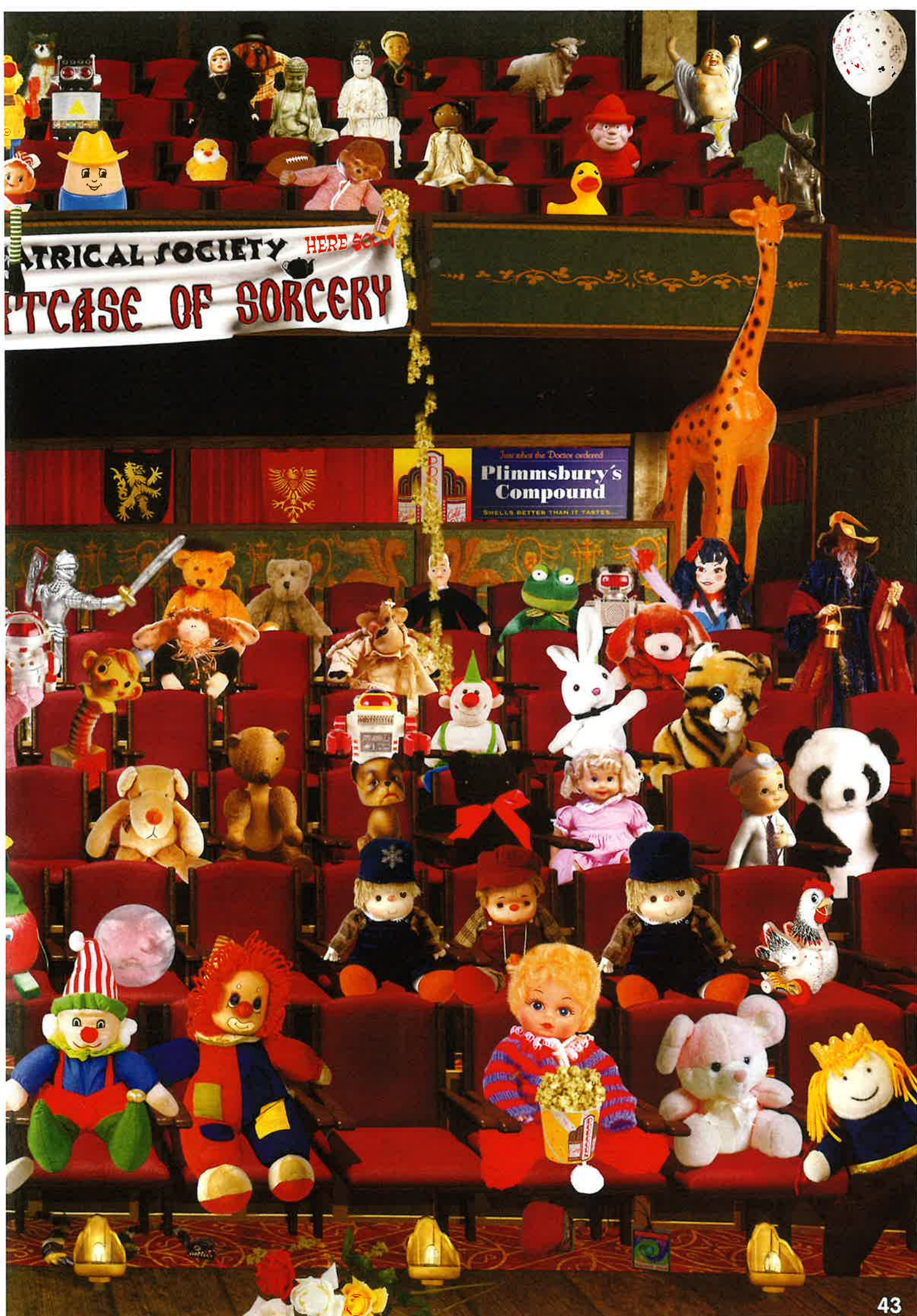
Mrs. Wallace Stark who owned "Blink Bonnie" at the time was one of the heaviest losers. The fire swept through the stables, cattle and sheep were burnt, acres of good grazing land, but fortunately the homestead was saved.

Lucy McCalman lost heavily in the fire too, but she was lucky to save her home. A motor truck belonging to Messrs. A.S. and .W.C. Carmichael was burnt, so too was Gus Dwyer's truck and he was severely burnt on both hands.

Two thousand five hundred acres of pines owned by the Sapfor, the result of eight years hard work were destroyed. Thirty buildings, 20,000 acres of fine grazing land.

In the wake of the fires many stories were told of heroism of the volunteer fire fighters. On the same day, north of Casterton at Brimboal, many properties were ringed by fire. At Nareen a lot of land and fencing belonging to Mr. T. Waters was burnt.

In the aftermath of the fires an Appeal was launched to aid the fire victims. Mrs. J.R. Bryan organised dances and socials for their benefit.
