Meeting begins at 1.36 PM

Previous meeting read and passed, seconded by R. Jordan

Business arising from previous meeting:

- New Physio's Visa has cleared, will be starting work at Edgarley within the next 2 weeks. Residents very excited to get back into the groove of exercise classes.
- New Happy Hour routine to be trialled this month, with Coleraine now also to be invited, alongside Glenelg House.
- IT specialists contacted about dinner bell, and are currently looking into methods of installing an automated roll call for afternoon meals and dinners.
- Dietitian has inspected draft of summer menu, will be making a few tweaks to meet the upcoming changes in Aged Care Standards.
- Noise in kitchenette still an issue, even during the meeting itself. DON Amanda Lee suggested to Head Chef Sam Hooper that perhaps dishes be taken down to kitchen to be cleaned, or to be washed only after, not during, meals, though there was debate as to the viability of these options. Leisure and Lifestyle also encouraged to ask kitchen staff to hold off on washing dishes during meetings.

General Business:

01: Steak: Some residents aren't happy with the way steaks are being prepared at Edgarley, with disagreements and debates about how it should be made and presented. The kitchen, in conjunction with Leisure and Lifestyle, will be organising a "steaking tasting", in which residents will be presented various styles and brands of steak, testing each one. A vote will then be held on which kind is the best.

02: Soup: A resident has issues with the soup presented at Edgarley, saying that it is too loaded with vegetables and pulp. A suggestion was made that the kitchen could always offer a soup-of-the-day, alongside more basic options like plain tomato or chicken soup.

03: Dr Services: Last month it was reported that we would be seeing an increase in weekly doctor visits to the facility. Unfortunately, this has not panned out due to the Riverview Clinic pulling out of Casterton and Tony Farnbach suddenly falling ill. CEO Susan Wray is trying to convert the old Cheers wing into a new local medical service for the town, benefitting both Edgarley and the Casterton community greatly.

04: Cribbage Boards: A few residents would like to play games of cribbage together, though the board they are currently using is in some disrepair. Judy Smith has offered to contact the Senior Citizens group to ask if they have any boards of their own that Edgarley could use.

05: Condiments: Residents requested more variety in available condiments for meal times, as most of the offerings consist of breakfast jams and spreads.

06: Kevin Sporer: A reminder about country-western singer Kevin Sporer's concert was given, letting residents know that he would be performing at Edgarley in the Alma Vickery Room on Friday the 9th. Residents were very excited to attend the show.

A FLASH IN THE SKY

Friday June 19th, 1964 began as just another working day for a Casterton auctioneer, as he sprang out of bed just after dawn in preparation for an auction sale he had in the little township at 10 a.m. As he gazed through the louvre windows in his sleepout overlooking the town, he was astounded to see a bright flash illuminating the town, the whole place was floodlit like day. It was an uncanny picture. From the Glenelg Inn and Island Park area the brilliant light hovered over the town for about twenty seconds, and then it was gone. Spellbound by what he had seen, he immediately rang John Eden, the early morning announcer for 3 DB, to tell him what he had seen, and that he had not been drinking.

Back came the announcer's reply "I am sure you haven't been drinking, because reports have been monitoring into the station that what you had seen, had also been reported in Adelaide, Keith, Nhill, Kaniva and Melbourne".

A man saw the flash from as far away as the Baker-Nunn camera satellite tracking station at Island Lagoon near Woomera. It was gone before he could get a good look at it. Early morning workers in Adelaide saw it.

A taxi driver travelling through the Adelaide suburb of Brooklyn Park saw it as a thin broadening streak giving off a terrific blue glow. It was so bright I could have read a newspaper by its light he said. A studio cleaner driving through the suburb of Prospect saw it, a big bullet nosed thing with pale green flames shooting from it. It lit up the buildings and the road like daylight. A woman truck driver at Keith in the south east saw it. A Senior Constable in charge of the Kaniva Police Station near the South Australian Border saw a blinding flash then a blue light in the sky as he drove east along the Western Highway. A schoolboy at Box Hill saw it a red, green and then orange bright light. An Airlines pilot flying 24,000 feet over Nhill saw it too. For fifty miles from the cockpit of his "Electra" the sky was lit up like day. It appeared to last for a few seconds and then go to ground over Nhill.

He thought it may have been a meteor or satellite going down. In Melbourne dozens of startled people had rung in to the radio stations to report the phenomenon. A man driving along Johnston Street, Collingwood, saw flames in the sky, and then a bright flash. He thought a plane had crashed near Werribee. In Belgrave Road, Belgrave, a man saw what he thought was a very large falling star at 5.02 a.m.

Astronomers and experts at Woomera thought it may have been a meteor exploding into the earth's atmosphere. Others thought it was a satellite burning up as it crashed down to earth.

Many theories were put forward to the origin of the strange light. It was in the early days of space exploration, the uppermost thought in all scientists minds, to walk on the moon. A senior scientific representative from the U.S.A., space organisation thought it may have been a fragment of a satellite or meteor.

For some days the flash in the sky was an object of wonder. It became the subject of strong media coverage. Many other people who for fear of being ridiculed now came forward and reported what they had seen.

Although many scientific reasons have been tabled for that strange light that flashed across the sky in the early hours of that winter morning in June, not one tangible answer has ever proved what the brilliant light really ever was.

1906 FLOOD

The years of 1893-4, Sunday, July 21st, 1906, and St. Patrick's Day, 1946, are the years that will long be remembered by the citizens of Casterton and district. They were momentous years of the big floods, when the Wannon and Glenelg Rivers spilled their banks. Swollen from incessant rains and storms, they flooded the low lying areas of the town. There was a great loss of stock, domestic animals and pets. In the town, fencing and buildings were washed away, and in some cases there was near loss of human life in which only for the devotion to duty, and the courage of its citizens, drowning fatalities could have occurred.

On the Saturday, 4 inches of rain put the Glenelg two to three feet higher than the 1894 flood, which at that time had been the highest recorded since the town was founded in 1846.

As the Angelus bell tolled out its seven o'clock morning peals from its high vantage point in the Catholic Church grounds, the township and the lower lying areas from the National Bank corner to the Ess Lagoon were just a seething mass of brown swirling water. Despite repeated warnings from the local police, residents in the low lying areas of Addison Street, Noss Road and the Ess Lagoon, would not evacuate their homes, hoping against hope that the flood would subside. By Monday dinner time the flood had reached the point of no return. Buggies, lorries, and drays were brought in by the police to forcibly eject people from the low lying homes.

The whole of Henty Street, from the Colonial Bank to the river was in flood. Gillespie's Store to the Post Office was unapproachable. Stewart and Smith's Blacksmiths shop and the Grant's Albion Hotel were under water. The Albion Hotel was then a single storey building, and the flood waters lapped the window sills. As Brocky Lambert rode his horse through the flood at the back of the Albion, he was alarmed to see George Grant, the proprietor, lose his footing as he tried to salvage some of his possessions. He galloped his horse into the flooded back yard, and flicked his stock whip to George who was able to hold on until bystanders got him back to "Terra Firma". Brocky Lambert's quick action probably saved George Grant from a watery grave. Commercial travellers staying at the hotel had to be rescued through the windows, and pumps were brought in to dry out the cellars.

Tom Carrol's Glenelg Inn was in a much more sorry plight. After a disastrous fire the hotel was just in the process of being rebuilt. The contractor, a Mr. Bennett, had only just sunk the concrete foundations when the Glenelg burst its banks.

The lime and concrete stored in the sheds, by some strange quirk of fate, caught fire, and Tom Carroll now had two hazards, fire and flood to contend with. By eight o'clock on Sunday morning, Casterton's oldest building was completely submerged, and everyone had to be evacuated. Mr. D'Amaral, like a ship's captain, stayed until the last, when a buggy had to be sent in to rescue him.

Cawker's Delivery Stables which housed the coaches, the harness horses and thoroughbreds trained by Tom Cawker were terrified by the flood waters and were let loose. Some were drowned as they tried to swim to higher ground.

Illingsworth's Carriage Factory, Starks Bakery, the Casterton News, then located at that end, Shipman's Boot Store, Murray McIntyre's Boarding House, Johnston's Typing Office, Edgar Bros. and A.E. Smith's premises, Auctioneers, were all under seige.

At Young Bros. Sale Yards in Murray Street, many sheep were drowned as they tried to swim to safety. Malcolm Campbell Senior's house was near the Ess Lagoon. He had refused all pleas to be evacuated. On Monday, one of the boys was seen perched precariously on the roof, the only portion visible, waving a red flag. Three flat bottom boats, the police and fire brigade under Captain Gill, Lieut. Scott, and J. Jelly headed the rescue team. Pat Burke, Sam McCombe and George Humphries all carriers were called in to the rescue. As the horses jerked forward in the flood waters with the rescued Campbells, a child fell into the flood from its father's arms, and the mother fainted in alarm, but happily all were brought to safety.

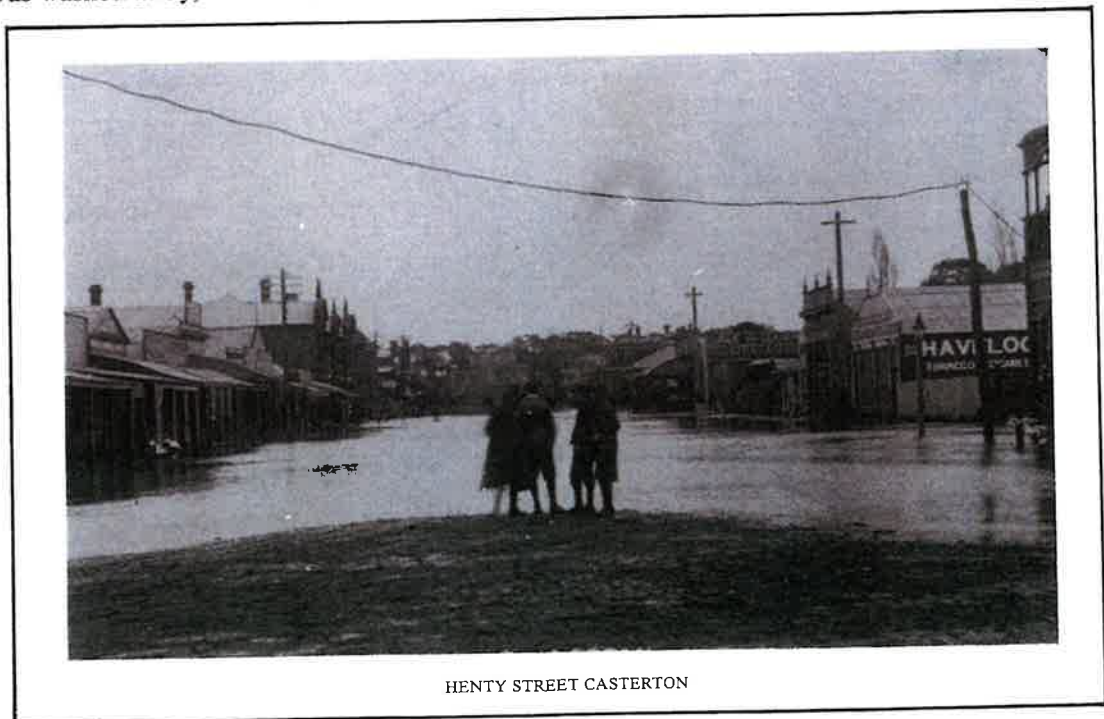
With the flood waters rising rapidly at an alarming rate, the Shire President Cr. Hepiziah Howlett, called an emergency meeting of the council. Police reinforcements were sent from Hamilton.

Footpaths in Henty Street were washed away, and at many homes huge crevices and cracks appeared in the ground. One resident was carried away in the flood under his house and was feared lost, but was later found clinging to a fence far away.

The Shire Hall and Presbyterian Church were set up as Havens for the homeless victims of the flood. Pedens, J.S. Peachey and John Jeffreys all had their stock ruined by the flood.

Carrisons Bridge Inn, the Bee-Hive Store, and four adjoining homes were a scene of disaster. Carrisons had a string of racehorses in their stables, and some these seen swimming away in the flood were never seen again.

The pattern of the flood seemed general throughout the district. At Melville Forest, J.G. Laidlaw recorded 422 points of rain from Friday till Monday. At Struan in the south east, the Railway Bridge over the Mosquito Creek was washed away, and all rail traffic between Adelaide and Mount Gambier was suspended. The rail and



HENTY STREET CASTERTON

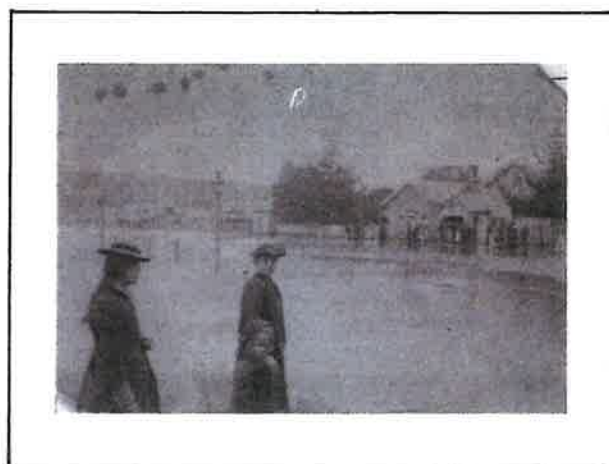
passenger coach between Casterton and Harrow was unable to cross the Moree Bridge, and had to return to Harrow and travel by Kadnook.

Harrow had its biggest flood since the big one of 1870, with the whole of the main street under water. Out of the Harrow flood came an incredible story of bravery and courage by a young man called Ted Gifford.

Two elderly Chinese called Ah Him and Sam Pow had a market garden with a hut and stables for their horses close to the Glenelg. Their hut was three feet under water, with the river 10 feet deep in places, and nearly 400 yards wide. Despite pleas by townfolk they refused point blank to leave their hut.

No boat was available, and Ted Gifford despite the roaring waters of the flood and intense cold, volunteered to swim through the flood to try and rescue them. When he reached the hut and stables he found the elderly Chinese perched high in the stable rafters, and cursing volubly in Chinese. He implored with them to come out, but the reply "No fear we get clothes wet. You poor fellow all wet now." Two horses and a dog were found shivering in the stables, and Ted Gifford was able to drive them out to safety. The Chinese flatly refused to leave the hut, and stayed there until the flood waters receded. For his bravery Ted Gifford was recommended to the Humane Society for a medal.

In Robertson Street, Casterton, Claude Crowl who lived with the Loggins (Mr. Loggin was a watchmaker and jeweller of the day), watched in dismay from his high vantage point as he could see his milking cow 'Polly' marooned in the flood waters on Racecourse Road. Grant's milking cows were isolated in the holding paddock by the river. Calling loudly to the cattle, Claude Crowl was relieved when Polly swam across barb wire fences and flooded waters to Jeffreys paddock and safety with Grant's cows in hot pursuit. Lance Hanley, who had a garage where McPhersons Chaff Mill now stands, lost everything in the flood and so did George Cox, who had a chaff mill at the rear of the Bridge Inn.



On July 14th, Dr. D'Ombrian, who had been presented with a purse of sovereigns at Mr. Bolton's office prior to his departure, had left the district.

Dr. Newman, the town's only remaining doctor was so busy attending to the townspeople suffering from shock and exposure, that he had to call in Dr. Morton from Merino.

On Monday morning, with the flood nearing its peak, and alarmed for their safety, Miss Reenee Price a school teacher, and who herself lived in Robertson Street, marshalled all the children together who lived on Toorak Hill, and took them home to higher ground and safety, even though they had to walk through rising waters on the big bridge.

"Brigadier" Scott the Shire Engineer was a tower of strength to the citizens of Casterton during the flood. A man of giant stature, he was reputed to be nearly 6 ft. 8 inches in height.

When the Shire row boats were paddled in to rescue the trapped citizens whose homes were surrounded by wire netting, he was able to step from the boats and his great height enabled him to stand on firm ground and cut the fencing with wire cutters.

By Monday night July 22nd, 1906, the rain had ceased, and although the local police kept a constant all night vigil, the level of the Glenelg began to fall. On Tuesday morning it was felt the immediate danger was over. Then began the herculean task of cleaning up the debris and the evil smelling mud and flotsam left behind. It was days before people could return to their homes. Some never went back.

Cleaning up the hotels and shops from the flood waters was a fearful task for the proprietors. There was a dreadful loss of stock, buildings and fencing.

For many of the Casterton people this was their second experience of a major flood within a decade.

Young children, then babes in their mother's arms were to go through another ordeal in 1946.

Although there are many stories of individual bravery and courage by the local townspeople; the local police, and the town's horse-drawn Fire Brigade deserved the highest commendation for their tremendous devotion to duty in a major disaster.

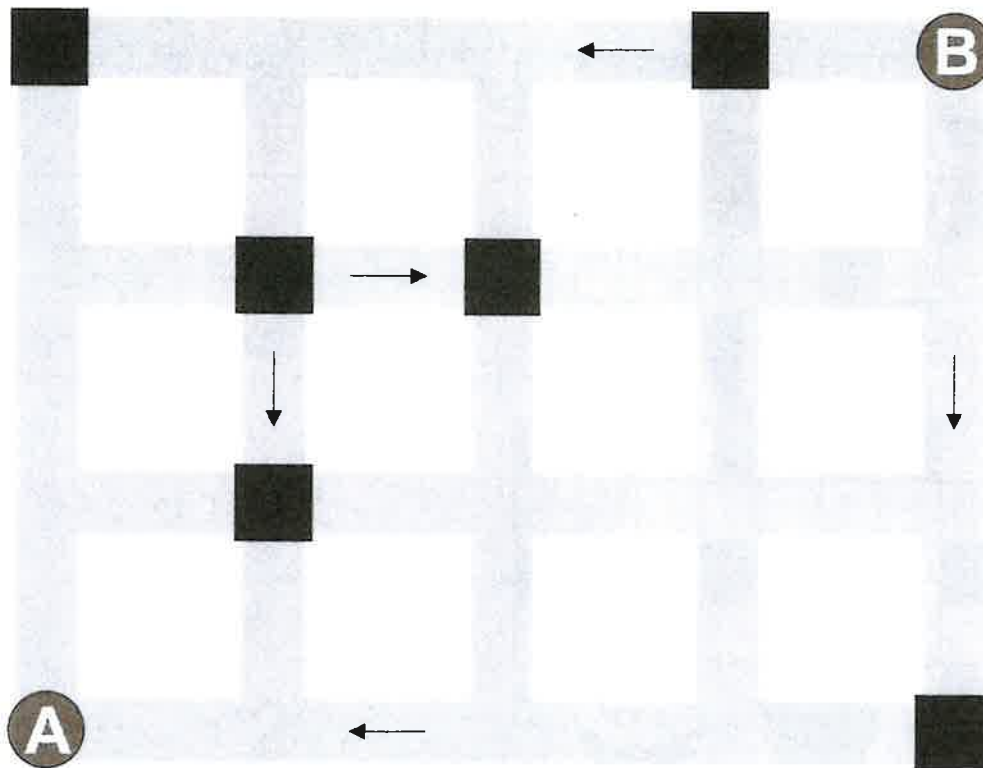
