

However, if they would like staff to provide transportation, the facility will handle the arrangements.

















# The pub in the scrub

Previous meeting read and passed, seconded by R. Jordan

#### Business arising from previous meeting:

- New Physio will be coming to Edgarley this month, after being delayed due to the sudden Covid outbreak.
- Breakfast condiments to be swapped out for sauces every lunch, then swapped back after dinner to jams and spreads for the morning.
- Trish Mckenzie has been in contact with O'Brian Electricals, who are working on getting an automated dinner bell system working at Edgarley.
- Two new cribbage boards purchased for enjoyment of residents, residents very pleased.
- Regarding noise in kitchenette, care staff will now gather all dishes onto a trolley, and then wait until
  all residents have left the dining room before washing the plates and cutlery. This will be trialed for a
  period of one month.
- Last month's country-western show a great success, so much so that Mr Sporer has been booked again for the 1st of November this year. Residents are very excited to see Mrs Wray boogie-down once more.

#### **General Business:**

- **01: Steak:** Last month a "steaking tasting" was organised, in which residents trialed various kinds of steak, gave notes, and discussed which steaks would be overall best for the facility to serve moving forward. Fillet steak, pan-fried on a grill, was agreed to be trialed at Edgarley for the course of one month.
- **02: New Medical Wing:** Early construction work has begun on old Cheers wing, with plans to turn it into a new medical clinic for both Edgarley and the town at large.
- **03:** Yoga Therapist: A yoga instructor has moved into town and offered her services to Edgarley. She has an expertise in specialised exercises that encourage brain repair in stroke patients, and exercises that can ease Parkinsons shakes for 2-3 hours. 2 residents have already signed up for her services, with others encouraged to do so. DON Amanda Lee also expresses her hope that with a new therapist and physio, morning exercise classes will resume.
- **04: Cribbage Boards:** A few residents would like to play games of cribbage together, though the board they are currently using is in some disrepair. Judy Smith has offered to contact the Senior Citizens group to ask if they have any boards of their own that Edgarley could use.
- **05: Condiments:** Residents requested more variety in available condiments for meal times, as most of the offerings consist of breakfast jams and spreads. A request for more sugar basins was also heard.
- **06: Aquarium:** A new aquarium, donated by Mandy Lee, has been installed in the Glenelg Wing. Les Power will be populating it with koi fish later this week.
- **07: Modified Food:** Recent issues raised about modified food led to a taste-testing by Edgarley staff members, the results of which were unsatisfactory. The facility has since been in contact with other manufacturing companies, and will be trialing these alternative options in the near future.
- **08: Soiree:** As the residents enjoyed moving-and-shaking to the Sporer concert so much, CEO Susan Wray has expressed interest in hosting a supper dance for the residents sometime in the future, with staff member Judy Jones performing and kitchen cooking up a special dinner.

#### THE KILLARA TRAGEDY

For scenes of rugged beauty and splendour, the Killara Forest at Bahgallah today is an unforgettable experience for many tourists who pass by and visit the area.

Thousands of acres of pine trees have been planted by the Sapfor and Forestry Commission, and these together with the natural bush of brown stringy bark, and red gum, grace the banks of the Glenelg River, where it meanders slowly down to its mouth via Nelson to the sea.

In the summer of eighteen ninety six, Killara was a vastly different area to what it is today. The Glenelg with its assured water frontage was a natural settlement for many farming properties.

There lived near the river the Baugh's, Vince Millard, the Galpin's, Wombwell's, and on a high bank towering over the Glenelg, Mr. and Mrs. H.R. Humphries and family. The Grundy's, Dowling's, Gasperino's, Somerville's, and Jessups to mention only a few.

The Humphries' farm was named "Silver Creek" deriving its name from a fresh water creek between the homestead and the river. It was a lovely property in a natural bush setting. On the steep river banks there grew, as there still is today, wild cherry and blackwood trees. Some of the mature red gums are 20 to 30 m. in height, and one overlooking the river shelters a rarely seen Wedge-Tail Eagle's nest. On the fertile banks above, there grew an abundance of wild black-berries. In the scrub amongst the belts of wattle trees, the bark was stripped by the farmers for tanning. The river teemed with fish, and in the deep holes shaded by Ti-tree, black fish, silver and mountain trout, native perch and eels were caught in abundance.

Many of the farmers were related, and it was a closely knit community. There were two schools for the children, one at the Bluff and one at Bahgallah. The Humphries family at Silver Creek was one of the most admired and esteemed at Killara. As they prospered they were blessed with a big family, seven sons and six daughters, a total of thirteen children. Mrs. Humphries was determined the children would receive a good education. Each day she would pick up all the children living in the neighbourhood, drive them to school in a type of drag to Bahgallah, and return them safely home at night.

The two children first born to the Humphries family were two lovely girls, Edith Jane a dark brunette, the eldest, and Caroline called "Liny" who was fair and two years younger than her sister. Their cousin Ada Wombwell, much younger than the two Humphries girls, was a constant playmate of her cousins at Silver Creek. The first week in February was a busy time for the Humphries family. It was time to thresh the wheat. Grundy's threshing machine had arrived at Silver Creek. For Mrs. Humphries it was the busiest time of the year. She had to feed and cook for all the hands on the thresher. The children had to be driven to school, in addition she had a babe in her arms. The two eldest children Edith Jane and Liny, had now grown to two happy-go-lucky teenagers of sixteen and fourteen years. They were the apple of their mother's eye.

Directly down from the wild blackberry banks there was a spot in the river called "The Corner Hole". It was a dark forbidding place, where the steep river banks overlooked the pool like perpendicular towers. It was full of snags, and hidden logs, a legacy from the big flood of 1893, with a strong undercurrent, a trap for even strong

swimmers.

On many occasions had Mrs. Humphries, when the girls went swimming warned them to avoid "The Corner Hole."

The first week of February, 1896 was hot and dry at Silver Creek. Dust from the thresher, as the engine chugged noisily across the river flats made it a most oppressive afternoon.

Ada Galpin suggested to her cousins they go for a swim in the river nearby. Liny and Margaret, another sister, and girl of twelve, were playing together. Liny joined Ada Galpin in the river. Margaret did not. Above the banks Edith was busily engaged in picking blackberries for her mother. Romping and playing in the shallows and sand banks. Ada Galpin began turning somersaults, singing happily to herself and Liny. Suddenly, to her horror, Liny noticed that Ada Galpin had overbalanced as she hopped and jumped, and fell into the "Corner Hole".

She never rose again. "The Corner Hole" had claimed its first victim. Although thoroughly alarmed at her cousin's disappearance, Liny Humphries with total disregard for her own life or safety, jumped into the river, searching for her cousin.

She too got into difficulties, and called frantically to her sister Edith for help. Edith rushed to her aid, but the courage and devotion to her sister for Edith, was to be in vain. Edith was a stronger swimmer than her sister, but it was to no avail.

Both the girls, now thoroughly exhausted, sank quickly, and the "Corner Hole" had added two more young lives to its tally.

The giant red gums looked down in mute disbelief. A brother of the girls, Bob Humphries, playing nearby, was the first to give the alarm. He was only a little boy of about five years, and had great difficulty in making himself understood to the people above the river. Mary Jane Humphries, the girls mother, was first on the scene. She had a tiny baby in her arms and had to be forcibly restrained by bystanders from jumping into the river in search of the children.

Despite herculean efforts by the men working on the thresher and kind neighbours, divers and searchers that day, could find no trace of the girls. It seemed incredible that in such a short space of time, where there were three happy-go-lucky girls, now there were none. Shock waves went through the community when news of the catastrophe reached Casterton.

At first light of dawn another search got under way for the drowned girls. Ada Galpin's body was found trapped beneath a snagged log, the other two were found on the bed of the river, clasped together as though in a final embrace, peacefully asleep.


February 11th, 1896 was a day of mourning and sorrow for Casterton as the Rev. J.A. Ball preached the Panegyric extolling the bravery and courage of the two sisters who gave up their lives at Silver Creek. A guard of honour from the tiny school at Bahgallah was formed at the Anglican Church doors.

The horse drawn funeral wended its way slowly to the Casterton Old Cemetry. Here the three girls rest peacefully in the same graveyard.

Mary Jane Humphries, who despite the tragedy that must have shattered her life, lived on till 1920, rearing a family of eleven children, the last surviving member, Eva Sylvester, died recently at Casterton. The father of the two girls, H.R. Humphries, lived on till the ripe old age of eighty seven years, and was buried with his wife and the three girls in 1948.

Today with the majestic bridge that spans the Glenelg at Killara, on the busy modern road to Dartmoor, it is a far cry to the tragic events that took place at Silver Creek nearly ten decades ago.

#### Celebrity spotlight

Born Virginia Katherine McMath on July 16, 1911, Ginger Rogers was an American actress, dancer, and singer. Known mostly for her dance partnership with Fred Astaire, she appeared in films as well as on stage. She was also featured on radio and television programs throughout much of the 20th century.

#### **Early Years of Ginger Rogers**

Ginger Rogers was born in Independence, Missouri, but she was raised mostly in Kansas City. Roger's parents separated before she was born. Her grandparents, Walter and Saphrona Owens, lived close to them. Her father kidnapped her twice, then she never saw him again. Her mother later divorced her father. Rogers moved in with her grandparents in 1915 so that her mother could make a trip to Hollywood to try to get an essay she had written made into a film. She was successful and went on to write scripts for Fox Studios.

Rogers remained close to her grandfather. She and her family moved to Texas when she was nine years old. She won a dance contest that helped her become successful in vaudeville. She became a well-known Broadway actress with debut stage role in Girl Crazy. She then received a contract with Paramount Pictures, which was short-lived.

In 1933, Rogers had a supporting role in the successful film 42nd Street. She starred in several films during the 1930s with Fred Astaire, such as Swing Time and Top Hat. She became one of the biggest box-office draws of the 1940s. She won the Academy Award for Best Actress for her performance in Kitty Foyle.

#### Film Roles



Rogers had a successful career in film. Her first movie roles were three short films made in 1929: Night in the Dormitory, A Day of a Man of Affairs, and Campus Sweethearts. In 1930, she signed a seven-year contract with Paramount Pictures. She broke the contract to move to Hollywood with her mother. In California, she signed a three-picture film deal and made feature films for Warner Bros., Monogram, and Fox. She then made a significant breakthrough as Anytime Annie in the Warner Brothers film 42nd Street (1933). She also made a series of films with Fox, Warner Bros., Universal, Paramount, and RKO Radio Pictures.

#### **Partnership With Fred Astaire**

Rogers was well-known for her partnership with Fred Astaire. Between 1933 and 1939, the pair made 10 musical films together: Flying Down to Rio, The Gay Divorcee, Roberta, Top Hat, Follow the Fleet, Swing Time, Shall We Dance, Carefree, and The Story of Vernon and Irene Castle. Together, the duo revolutionized the Hollywood musical. They introduced elegant dance routines, set to songs specially composed for them by the greatest popular song composers.

The couple's dance routines were mostly choreographed by Astaire, but Rogers had significant input. In 1986, Astaire said "All the

girls I ever danced with thought they couldn't do it, but of course they could. So they always cried. All except Ginger. No no, Ginger never cried".

Astaire respected Rogers. He once said that when they were first paired together in *Flying Down to Rio*, "Ginger had never danced with a partner before. She faked it an awful lot. She couldn't tap and she couldn't do this and that ... but Ginger had style and talent and improved as she went along. She got so that after a while everyone else who danced with me looked wrong."

#### **Personal Life**

Rogers first married at age 17 to her dancing partner Jack Pepper in 1929. They divorced in 1931. In 1934, she married actor Lew Ayres. They divorced seven years later. In 1943, Rogers married her third husband, Jack Briggs, a U.S. Marine. They divorced in 1949. In 1953, she married Jacques Bergerac, a French actor. They divorced in 1957. She married her last husband in 1961. He was director and producer William Marshall. They divorced in 1971.

Rogers was a Christian Scientist. She devoted a great deal of time to her faith. She was also a member of the Republican Party. She died at home on April 25, 1995, at the age of 83. It was determined that the cause of death was a heart attack.





# Born this month

October 2<sup>nd</sup> Indian political and spiritual leader Mohandas (Mahatma) Gandhi (1869-1948) was born in Porbandar, India. He achieved worldwide fame for his devout lifestyle and nonviolent resistance which ended British rule over India. He was assassinated by a religious fanatic in the garden of his home in New Delhi on January 30, 1948.

October 9<sup>th</sup> John Lennon (1940-1980) was born in Liverpool, England. He was a member of *The Beatles*, an influential rock group which captivated audiences first in England and Germany, and later in America and throughout the world. He was murdered in New York City on December 8, 1980.



October 10<sup>th</sup> Italian opera composer Giuseppi Verdi (1813-1901) was born in Le Roncole, Italy. His 26 operas include; *Rigoletto, Il Trovatore, La Traviata* and *Aida*, and are among the most popular of all classical music performed today



October 16<sup>th</sup> Irish poet and playwright Oscar Wilde (1854-1900) was born in Dublin, Ireland.

Best known for his comedies including; *The Importance of Being Earnest*. And his novel *The Picture of Dorian Gray* in which he wrote, "There is only one thing in the world worse than being talked about and that is not being talked about."

October 20<sup>th</sup> British architect Christopher Wren (1632-1723) was born in Wiltshire, in southwestern England. Considered one of the greatest minds of his time, he designed St. Paul's Cathedral and 52 churches for the City of London. His secular buildings included the "new" wing of Hampton Court near London and Greenwich Hospital, now the Royal Naval College.

October 25<sup>th</sup> Artist Pablo Picasso (1881-1973) was born in Malaga, Spain. He was an experimental painter and also became a fine sculptor, engraver and ceramist.

October 27<sup>th</sup> Welsh poet and playwright Dylan Thomas (1914-1953) was born in Swansea, Wales. His works included; The World I Breathe, Portrait of the Artist as a Young Dog, The Doctor and the Devil and the drama Under Milk Wood.

October 31<sup>st</sup> Chinese soldier and statesman Chiang Kai-shek (1887-1975) was born in Chekiang. Educated at the Wampoa Military Academy, he led the KMT (nationalist) forces in the struggle against the Communist army led by Mao Zedong.


